HOPE Scholarship

- You will start earning a college scholarship their first day in 9th grade (8th grade classes for high school credit *do not* count toward HOPE)
- Academic classes in your Freshman year will count toward their GPA (Grade Point Average)
- HOPE scholarships are awarded with 3.0 (B) or higher core GPA
- Students must take 4 "rigor" classes to qualify (listed on website & student packet)

Core GPA for Hope

- Math, Science, Social Studies, English and World Language classes "count" in determining your Core Grade Point Average
- No weighting of AP or Honors Classes
- Calculating Core GPA: Average your grades (A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, F=0)

If your Report Card had

- 5 A's
- 7 B's
- 3 C's
- 1 F

These grades would result in a 2.9 Core GPA!
